
THE U.S.-JAPANESE RELATIONSHIP

Four major U.S.-Japan surveys showed deterioration in the relationship in 1992. It may be premature, however, to see permanent erosion. U.S. opinion leaders, more positive about U.S.-Japanese prospects generally, say cooperation declined. Still, they see overall compatibility.

Question: Do you think that relations between the United States and Japan are very good, good, just fair, or poor at present?






Question: In general terms, how would you describe the present level of cooperation between Japan and the United States-excellent, good, fair, or poor?

Frictions and Prospects

Majorities in both countries see relations as friendly. Less than a quarter see relations getting worse, and pluralities in both places say they will stay the same. One source of friction is trade. Seven in ten in Japan and the United States believe both nations share blame for frictions.




Question: How would you describe relations between Japan and the United States today? Would you say relations are very friendly, somewhat friendly, somewhat unfriendly, or very unfriendly?


Question: The United States and Japan have experienced some friction in their economic relations during the past several years. What do you think explains this friction? You may name as many or as few explanations as you wish from the following list.

is or is not a dependable ally of the United


