



The President's Approval Ratings, January 1995 to Present: Four Polling Views

Question: In general, do you approve or disapprove of the job Bill Clinton is doing as president?





Question: Do you approve or disapprove of the way Bill Clinton is handling his job as president?






Question: Do you approve or disapprove of the way Bill Clinton is handling his job as president?

Question: "Do you approve or disapprove of the way (name) is handling his job as president?"










Question: Do you think Bill Clinton has **strong qualities of leadership**, or not?








Looking Backward: How Americans Viewed Clinton in 1992

Question: Do you think Bill Clinton as president will bring about the kind of change the country needs?












Current Policies: Clinton Has The Upper Hand
