
WHITEWATER:

The Public Calls the Issue Serious


Concern is widespread that the President and First Lady have been less than honest



Question: Do you think **President Clinton** is telling the truth or not telling the truth about his personal finances and his involvement in the Whitewater affair?






Question: Do you think **Hillary Rodham Clinton** is telling the truth or not telling the truth about her personal finances and her involvement in the Whitewater affair?


Different readings on whether the public's attention to this issue is waxing or waning


A significant portion of the public believes there has been a cover-up

Question: Do you think **President Clinton** has participated in a cover-up of the Whitewater situation or not?






Most would like the First Lady to testify before Congress, though the investigation is viewed as partisan sniping
